## History: Scots, Anglo-Saxons and Vikings

## **Overview of unit**

This unit takes the children on a journey back in time as they find out about life in Britain during the time of the Anglo-Saxons and Scots and then they find out about the Viking and Anglo-Saxon struggle for the kingdom of England and how England became a unified country. The children will explore where the Anglo-Saxons and Vikings came from, how they fought for territory and power, and how their fighting ultimately led to the kingdom of England we know today. Along the way, they will also find out what life was like for everyday people living in Anglo-Saxon and Viking Britain, exploring things such as Viking runes and Anglo-Saxon stories like Beowulf.

## **Key Questions**

- Explain how the Anglo-Saxons came to Britain?
- Give an overview of what life was like in the 8th century before the Viking invasions?
- Recognise and describe the different perspectives of the Viking invasions?
- Describe how the Vikings gained control of the northeast of England?
- Suggest reasons why he was dubbed 'Great'?
- Identify similarities and differences between Viking and Anglo-Saxon life?
- Do you know what happened in 1016?
- Describe the main events surrounding the Norman conquest?
- Do children know that the Battle of Hastings ended the era of Anglo-Saxon and Viking rule in Britain?
- Other questions to consider throughout the unit:
  - Where are English people from?
  - Who was the first king of England?
  - Was England always a Christian country?
